ALCA Members Enjoy DOTH

On February 10, sixty-three counselors from throughout the state travelled to Montgomery to attend ALCA's annual Day on the Hill. Speakers for the morning included Mr. Bill Newton, Acting State Finance Director, Dr. Don Williamson, Director of the Alabama Department of Public Health and Dr. Tommy Bice, Deputy Superintendent, ALSDE.

Keynote Speakers Mr. Newton explained some of the many financial complications with which he deals every day such as dividing the \$18 billion in the state budget among education, health, transportation and law enforcement. He said that the next 18 months will be tough but a year from now we will have more optimism than we now have.

Dr. Williamson's department oversees the nuclear regulatory agency, the health care regulatory agency, the vital records agency, the environmental regulatory agency and direct patient services such as family planning, home health, and child health insurance. He talked extensively about prevention; about 10% of the Alabama population has diabetes. Alabama is among the top states in diabetes, stroke, obesity, and least physical activity. He emphasized that "We must figure out ways to motivate kids to limit calories, improve physical fitness and make healthy choices."

Dr. Bice cited examples of school that work: schools that listen to students and work to meet their needs, schools that believe that students can learn, schools that set expectations and support them, schools that are doing innovative things to keep

The Grammar Geek Speaks: Watch those Reflexive and Intensive Pronouns!

What, you ask, is a reflexive pronoun?

It refers back to a noun or pronoun. It does not stand alone. Examples are myself, himself, herself, themselves, etc.

Correct: Please send family news to me. **Incorrect:** Please send family news to myself.

NO! The grammar geek growls!!

Correct: My friend Jane and I love chocolate!

Incorrect: My friend Jane and myself love chocolate!

NO! The geek growls again!

Now what is an intensive pronoun?

It emphasizes its antecedent (the noun/pronoun that comes before it)

Correct examples: I myself love dancing! The principal himself visited our meeting.

Please do not substitute a reflexive/intensive pronoun for a solid noun or correct pronoun. If you are in doubt, DO NOT use a self word at all....ever!!

ALRRS's Don Gibson Dies

Don Gibson of ALCA's legislative reading service died in March. His wife, Carolyn, wrote Dr. Ervin L. Wood, Executive Director of ALCA, about his death and stated, "Don loved his work and each client held a special place with him. His priority was always first and foremost the clients of ALRRS in providing them a convenient service with high ethical standards, integrity and commitment...Don will be greatly missed by his family and many friends."

Dr. Wood, states, "I have been in Alabama for 38 years. During that entire time Don Gibson has been one of the best known higher education and political leaders in the state. He had a very successful career at Troy University as the chief student affairs officer. At the same time he represented Troy's political interests in Montgomery. That he was able to do both so well is a compliment to his ability and work ethic. I was fortunate enough to work with him at Troy for ten years. From him I learned a great deal about the concepts of higher education. I would also quickly add that I am not sure that I have ever known a person more knowledgeable and adept at the Alabama political process than he. I was also able to glean a little of that from him. Following his retirement from Troy, he moved to Montgomery and began a second career as a political advisor and mentor. His company, the Alabama Legislative Reading and Research Service, became the most respected political research and advisement service in the state having a wide variety of clients. I am proud to report that the Alabama Counseling Association was Don's first client - a fact he never forgot when it came to service and cost. Everyone I ever talked to told me that Don had related our friendship and ALCA's stature in his mind to them. His wife Carolyn is correct that Don loved his work and his clients. He will be missed by his family, colleagues, and friends."

The Dichotomy of Eating Disorders and Self Harm

February was host to the National Eating Disorder Awareness Week, and Alabama is fortunate to have a national treatment center for eating disorders that meets the needs of clients struggling with anorexia, bulimia, and binge-eating disorder. Many Alabama providers, including school counselors, marriage counselors, and family therapists, may be working with individuals with eating disorders, but may not have a clear understanding of the disorder or how to treat it.

Much like other disorders mental health counselors treat, eating disorders are equally prevalent and under-recognized. In fact, it is not uncommon for clients being treated for addictions to have some disordered eating characteristics. Eating disorders have a similar progressive development as clients with drug addictions including biological, psychological and social components. However, unlike chemical addictions in which the treatment requires abstaining from the chemical or addictive substance, such is not the case with eating disorders. Food is a daily part of living and clients cannot be asked to stop eating. Treatment for these disorders requires counselors to help their clients develop a healthy relationship with the very substance with which they struggle.

Individuals with eating disorders report intense negative emotions, commonly fear, shame and guilt. To relieve themselves of these negative emotions many result to self-harm in addition to restricting, purging, over-exercising, laxative, diuretic abuse, etc. Recent studies show that 60% of people diagnosed with bulimia engage in self-harm behaviors; and up to 10% of individuals diagnosed with eating disorders in general die by suicide. Eating disorders have the highest mortality rate of any disorder in the DSM-IV TR which makes it the deadliest mental illness counselors treat.

It is often the case that counselors dread working with eating disorders or with self-harm. Put the two together and this population is largely misunderstood and stereotyped. Fortunately, there is research that indicates that Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) may be effective in treating self-harm and eating disorders. There is some recent evidence that suggests that DBT may be particularly effective in individuals with the combination of self-harm and eating disorders. DBT utilizes strategies to address emotional dysregulation and distress tolerance, common symptoms in individuals with self-harm and eating disorders. Instead of restructuring or reframing cognitive distortions, as in Cognitive Behavior Therapy, DBT teaches mindfulness, tolerance, and acceptance. These techniques of validation and acceptance paradoxically foster change and growth.

Eating disorders and self-harm have typically been difficult syndromes to treat. DBT may provide an avenue of treatment that is beneficial to both disorders. With the required training to practice DBT, counselors may be better equipped to treat individuals with eating disorders who also self-harm. CONTENT SESSION SELECTION PROCEDURES

Content program proposal forms will ask those submitting proposals to indicate the intended division audience for the program. These may be either a division or ALCA (for programs of general interest). Interested divisions for each content session will be noted in the program book.

The number of content session slots will be determined by the ALCA Program Chair (President-elect), taking into consideration the number of slots allotted in the past years and the number of rooms available for content programs.

80% of the available content program slots will be assigned to divisions as determined by the following formula: (the total number of slots assigned to divisions) multiplied by (the percent of the total ALCA membership of the division) equals the number of programs selected per division. Any program slots not used by divisions will be reassigned under ALCA allotment.

20% of the available content program slots will be assigned to ALCA. By recognizing that the membership of ALCA share common interests in addition to the specifics of their division memberships, the opportunity exists for developing ALCA membership identity.

Content programs will be selected at a meeting convened by the ALCA Program Chair (President-elect). A quorum will comprise members present at the meeting. The ALCA Program committee will be composed of the ALCA Program Chair, the ALCA Fall Conference Chair and a representative from each division. Each division representative will be appointed by the division president.

SCOPE OF THE PROPOSALS

All content session proposals are submitted to the ALCA Conference Program Committee for consideration as a Conference Content Session and include the following categories:

Regular Programs

Proposals should be planned to remedy gaps in knowledge, to provide skills, innovative methodologies and procedures, and to be responsive to the interests of Association members.

Student Programs

Graduate and Undergraduate students are invited to submit proposals related to counseling and development practices. Faculty members should encourage students to submit proposals.

Research Programs

Submission of recent research findings and their practical applications are invited. Researchers whose programs are selected are encouraged to bring copies of their work for distribution at the sessions.




